# "God Blesses us, We are Blessed, We Bless Others"

My birthday comes in July and I'm still counting. My family always said I was born "with a bang" because they claimed it all got started right after my Mom climbed the bleachers for the fireworks on the 4<sup>th</sup>. Two years ago when I turned 75, I threw a party because, well, I like parties. What I remember most about it was that many who were older could only say things like "that's not old" or "you are a spring chicken" or wait to you get "really old." It felt like they were trying to take away my joy or excitement or enthusiasm at being 75, or in my words, because it sounds better, "I'm three quarters of a century old." That gives it some dignity, I protested.

Anyway, this July month includes, I'm told, the 243<sup>rd</sup> birthday of our nation if you start with the Declaration of Independence or the 527<sup>th</sup> if you start with Columbus. Wherever you start, we are old, though not nearly as old as many others around the world, many of whom might be called "ancient."

I know many of you have heard the expression "God Bless America." I like that when it is understood as a prayer, or a solemn thought for meditation, or even a wish on the part of a loyal citizen. I like the recent addition to Major League Baseball contexts, which includes the singing of "God Bless America" during the 7<sup>th</sup> inning

stretch. What I fear is that the "God Bless Americas" we hear, would sound more like a demand than a prayer. It's spoken or shouted in a way that sounds like we have earned this or deserve it or somehow have a right to it; come on God, get with the program. I rebel against that kind of thinking and approach for a lot reasons.

I would like to think that you, and everyone, are joining me on this birthday of our nation in thanking God for this nation and every blessing we have as citizens in it, including its natural beauty and abundant resources, the diversity of its citizens, the freedoms we enjoy, including the joyful practice of our faith, the protection of our civil rights, the prosperity we enjoy, and more.

Of course, I'm saying, and many of you are thinking, there is a good bit wrong with our nation. Only someone who has their head in the sand, or works hard at turning a blind eye would say, we do not have problems. It would be great if we could all embrace those problems and work together in faithful and reasonable ways, in a spirit of cooperation, to improve difficult situations like immigration, Medicare, equality for all, the health care system, the opioid crisis, feeding the hungry, housing for the poor, climate change, and more.

In talking about God blessing America, how about this idea? To bless means to give something, or to add something to another or a situation in a good way, a positive way, or a helpful way. How about if we would use the blessings, the gifts and freedoms we have as citizens of the US of A, to bless our nation, especially in areas where it is

desperately needed, and in places in need around the world? Using and sharing the gifts, freedoms, resources, knowledge, and technical resources we have, to bless others, would certainly add to the lives of others in our own nation and around the world. In fact, I believe that is exactly what God wants us to do, and why he has given us so many blessings, so that we can share our blessings with each other and the world. Perhaps the hymn, I will call it, God Bless America has an equally valuable second emphasis for Americans to bless America and the world.



## News from the Quilters....

It seems like we have two shifts in our quilting group. Some early birds come in at 7:00 AM. We set up the tables, get the work to be done out, water the flowers, make the coffee and start sewing on whatever our job is at the time. The others come in whenever, but they stay till 1:00 PM. or later. It's their turn to continue the work that is started, then they put the things away, take down the tables, clean the coffee pot and the floors and lock the doors.

Some members do not attend every week but we average 15 girls every Tuesday. We use 2 sergers and have an average of 7 people sewing on machines, others cut fabric, iron, pin, put yarn in them and tie the quilts. We find a job for everyone.

We still make children's blankets for the Binky Patrol program, patriotic laps for the veterans and don't forget the homeless blankets. Our specialty are the laps and twin size blankets that we give away to the veterans homes, the nursing homes and just anyone who could use one. We invite YOU to ask for one or more if you know a need. You can also support us by donating used jeans, sheets, and mattress covers, and by attending and promoting our annual Quilt Sale.
